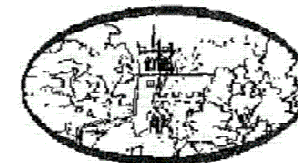

From Canon Rodney Nicholson

Viewpoint



THERE have been some excellent television programmes recently. The Preston Passion was televised on Good Friday. Although the video clips of three stories were, I thought, too long, and the commentary rather missed the point about why Jesus died, the play itself was riveting and excellently presented, showing the essential unity among the Preston churches. The best story, I thought, was the last one about a primary school girl who lovingly cared for her inebriate mother, making the tea for her younger brother and sister. The Children's Society tries to help these child carers.

There has also been a BBC2 series on chaplains in Liverpool which has really been heart-warming. They have not all been Christian chaplains: the series has followed a Jewish chaplain, working in a delightful way with Jewish students, and a Muslim chaplain similarly doing a caring job.

The Christians included the Anglican and Roman Catholic chaplaincy team at Alder Hey Children's Hospital and the Street Pastors. Street Pastors operate in many towns, with the full support of the police, offering kindness to young people in danger as they spill out of the nightclubs. They offer girls flip-flops, for example, to avoid cutting their feet on broken glass. Why bother? These Christians just want to show the compassion of Christ.

The hospital chaplains give huge support especially to mothers with a very sick child who might, for example, need over ten operations. Probably not churchgoers, these mothers turn to the chaplain for support and prayer. One young mother - a single parent, it seemed - had really become a Christian through an experience of God's peace and love which overwhelmed her as she walked away from the operating theatre.

Sometimes we hear that expression, which to my mind is absurd, "We're all in it together". By nature, human beings are not "in it together". We look after our own interests. These chaplains really are in the thick of it. But, then, so was God. In the cross of Christ he shared in the world's suffering, and through the Ascension, celebrated on May 17th, he draws the pain right to his own heart. As he returned to heaven, Jesus brought with him the wounds and the scars.

Jenny was very close to her mother - as she is to her dad, my brother - and Margaret would have revelled in all the preparations as well as in the wedding itself. I'm sure she did rejoice, even so, from where she is now.

The marriage took place in the historic Lancaster Priory, our "family church". Wine or Schloer were served in church afterwards. Weddings always take a long time, so I was able to pop into town to pay some cheques in at the bank while the first lot of photos were being taken.

We then travelled to Grange-over-Sands for the reception at the Grange Hotel. Such a venue would be outside our price range - we're more village hall people - but my brother is financially quite well off and very generous too. He chose Grange, however, for its proximity to the Lake District so as to give Luke's family a taste of the north country's good scenery. About 15 of them had made the journey, so my brother, Andrew, wanted them to enjoy their visit to the full.

Jenny and Luke looked blissfully happy, surrounded by well-wishing family and friends. Kathleen and I travelled with Rachel and Jonathan, staying for the ceilidh but not the disco afterwards, which our son, Richard, ran.

Kathleen and I were talking about how wedding gifts have changed from the days when anyone gave anything to help a young couple to set up home, to the practice of couples sensibly producing a gift list (to avoid getting five teapots!), and so to the new situation when couples already have their home furnished and equipped. Couples today have usually been living together for some time, although I know some committed Christians who feel it right to wait until marriage before taking that step. Accordingly, Jenny and Luke, like some other couples, invited gifts towards the cost of their honeymoon, when they plan to do a lot of travelling, although they stressed that guests had no need to give anything at all.

It's a different concept but we delight in a couple's love and commitment whether or not they have previously lived together.

Downham & Twiston History Group

At our March, meeting on 26th the speaker Mr Brian Stott gave an interesting illustrated talk about Rimington, touching on the Village buildings, characters and occupations. Brian very kindly came at fairly short notice because of the gap left by Elizabeth and the general inability of other members to step in with the same depth of knowledge.

At the April 23rd meeting the speaker was Mrs Marion Hutchinson, her topic "Grindleton", who introduced members to a concept which many had not heard of—Landscape History—the study of the way in which humanity has changed the physical appearance of the environment was first recognised as a separate area of study following the publication of *The Making of the English Landscape* by W.G.Hoskins, in 1955. It uses evidence and approaches from other disciplines including archaeology, architecture, ecology, aerial photography and local history.

In Grindleton, Marion's chosen area of study, members were given a slide show of features, many of which could be dated and some which begged more questions than they answered. These ranged from ditches, strip field-systems which showed up when the land was flooded or covered in snow, wall remnants, tree plantings, retaining banks, remains of pack-horse roads and other features. Most interesting was the series of landmarks which defined the long-lost flax industry. Embankments, ponds and small sluices to control the flow of water are still quite clearly visible. Some speculation about the roofless buildings at the junction between the Chatburn Road and the Waddington to Sawley Road, ended a most fascinating discussion.

On 16th May, at 7.30 pm the Group has decided to attend Barley Village Hall for the meeting of Pendle Forest History Group, when the topic is *The Lancashire Witches 1612 to 2012* by Robert Poole of Lancaster University.
